Year two of the partnership between HCE and the Kewaunee Chamber of Commerce is upon us, and is underway for the 2022 season.

Reviewing 2021, over the course of 12 weeks HCE took in a little over \$3,200.00 after covering costs. The partnership with the Chamber of Commerce came at a good time; during Covid there was no fundraising events for almost two years. Also we have lost the Pig Roast Fundraiser permanently. Due to the partnership we were able to help the school supply drive, WI Bookworms, and provide a scholarship.

There were some interesting things that happened during the summer, it rained the first night and we had to move to Lakehaven Hall, making a first-night small turnout even smaller. That night the gent that won the 50% of the 50/50 raffle donated it all back! Then to turn our surprise to astonishment, he gave us \$13.00 more to make his donation an even \$100.00!

Generously Mari and Dan Fager donated a honey basket and it was a raffle hit! The Wisconsin Bookworms raffle prizes were wonderful, they had coffee and tea, and baking mixes from Door County Coffee.

At the beginning of summer, we tried to sell snacks and beverages: nearing the end of summer, we had a lot of snacks left, so we assembled small baskets and raffled those snacks. Our Scholarship Committee made a tidy profit on those small baskets, actually it was more after the 50/50 winner donated \$100.00 back to our organizations which was split between HCE Scholarship and the Chamber. Last year many of the members said it was fun to

get out and meet people in our community, raise funds for worthy causes and to get some exercise. Many people asked last year why did we partner with the Chamber of Commerce? It seems odd, HCE is not in business so why the association? The answer from Mari Fager is "mutual benefit," meaning when the lines are blurred, both entities are better served. We partner for other organizations as well. We do a program each year with the Kewaunee County Garden Club. We bake cookies for the VIP program in Kewaunee County. We bake for the Zoo, we volunteer at the Chamber building, which helps local businesses which in turn benefits our entire community.

### Dogs & Pies


There will be a meeting on July 6, 2022 at the Waterfront Bar in Kewaunee to plan for our two upcoming Music In The

## Friends of Crescent Beach Wrap

Lakeshore Legacy & Sunshine thank you!

On Wed., June 15, 2022, Kewaunee County HCE sponsored the Friends of Algoma Crescent Beach. Our speaker for the Steering Committee was Cathy Pabich. She shared information about the beach and described community activities engaged in by the group, including volunteer effort to add native plants to the beach landscape and the annual Soar on Shore and beach party. The boardwalk was placed 26 years ago. Before that, the city knew there was the problem of algae, erosion, invasive plants, litter, pollutants, sediment from the Ahnapee River which brings odor. A quote was "When you don't know what to do, do the thing in front of you. Let's not be a part of the problem." 2015 started the Lakeshore Natural Resource Partnership. Overall goal was to stabilize the shoreline and restore a diverse natural habitat. They removed invasive garlic mustard, Queen's Ann's lace, burdock, sweet clover and others. Replaced with golden rod, beach grass, wild columbine, butterfly weed and others. Money from a grant was used. There is a 1 hour morning crew and a 1 hour evening crew to assist in maintenance and improvement of the Algoma Visitor Center landscape. Also the hanging town flowers. Volunteers do clean up of the thousands of cigarette butts which take 10 years to decompose and are filled with pollutants. The crew works May to September. 120 students from 3<sup>rd</sup> grade to middle school do the Adopt a Beach to help. \$15,828 was raised for the city to use on the beach and \$8000 of that went for new waste bins. Bike racks were also purchased. In 2015, the Soar on the Shore festival started up and continues every 3<sup>rd</sup> week in August from 11-4 with huge kites and kite fans from all over. The Friends' wish list is getting completed with filters for storm water going into the lake, trash bins, and plants. The DNR is doing water test on the Ahnapee River, and the beach is tested twice a week for bacteria during the summer. They clean up Olson Park where all the street snow removal goes, again dumping trash and cigarette butts. They hope to get restrooms with changing rooms in the future. Submitted by Judy Malcore

# **Lavender Program Report**

Lavender is a native to countries in the Mediterranean region including France, Spain and Italy. The name lavender comes from the Latin verb "lavare" to wash. In ancient Rome, lavender was a bath additive. Lavender is used to flavor foods and beverages and as a fragrance ingredient in soaps and cosmetics. It is promoted as a dietary supplement for anxiety, depression and digestive symptoms and other conditions. It is also used for aromatherapy. Lavandula (common name lavender) is a genus of 47 known species of flowering plants in the mint family. It is native to the Old World and is found in Cape Verde and the Canary Islands and from Europe across northern and eastern Africa and the Mediterranean and southwest Asia to India. The most common form gardens world-wide they are frequently found growing wild and becoming invasive as is the case in Australia where it has been declared a noxious weed. Lavender flourish best in dry, well -drained soil in full sun. English

lavender has a long germination process {14-28 days} and matures within 100-110 days. All types need little or no fertilizer and good air circulation. In areas of high humidity, root rot due to fungus infection can be a problem. Gravelly materials such as crushed rocks give better results. It grows best in soils with a ph between 6 and 8. Most lavender is hand harvested and harvest times vary depending on intended use. English lavender is usually used in cooking as it has a sweet fragrance with lemon and citrus notes. French lavender because of its more potent aroma and oils is used more for soaps aromatherapy products, lotions etc.
