### State Conference 2022 Reports

The WAHCE Annual Conference in Onalaska on Sept.19-21, 2022 had 5 different breakout sessions, each with 5 different choices of subjects. That's in addition to the podcast humorist keynote speaker that was so entertaining! I chose sessions on Sustainable Living, Casting for Membership, Protecting Yourself in the Digital World, Gardening as Your Garden Grows and Prairie Wildflowers for Attracting Butterflies, Birds & Pollinators. It was hard to choose topics when I registered several months ago, since there were so many other subjects and I could only pick one per time slot! I could have signed up for wine making, soap making, embroidery, dementia and brain health, Immune function and nutrition, and another ten plus choices.

My favorite session was listening to Neil Dibill, president of Prairie Nursery. He spoke on the subject of Prairie Wildflowers and pollinators. He started with a small business nearly 20 years ago, selling native plants and teaching others the importance of having plants that support pollinators and our ecosystem. He has become an expert on native plants and his nursery near Madison has grown immensely. I have heard him speak on the Larry Mieller Garden Talk show on WPR 88.1 radio show several times in the past few years, so it was interesting to meet him in person and get a copy of his wonderful Prairie Nursery seed and plant catalog. *Submitted by Shirley Nell*
